

"The Highlights of the By-Gone Days of V.S.D.B." 1839-1979

"The Virginia Institution for the Deaf and Dumb and the Blind—A noble monument of philanthropy, raised by intelligence for intelligence; though her inmates be dumb to speak their emotions, or blind to the grandeur and sublimity of nature, yet they have hearts that can swell and thoughts that can soar." These words were actually said on July 9, 1840 following the ceremony of laying the cornerstone of the Virginia Institution for the Deaf and Dumb and the Blind, now known as the Virginia School for the Deaf and the Blind. The statement of July 9th was made at the 12th toast out of 23 toasts at the dinner on the site of the ceremony. The oration was done by James McDowell

Today, we don't know where the cornerstone is.

Let us go back to April 4, 1839 and read the first sentence in an article of a newspaper: "We have a very great satisfaction to state that the resolution of the House of Delegates, designating Staunton as the location of the Asylum for the Deaf and Dumb and the Blind, has been concurred in by the Senate.

Today our school is not an asylum at all. Many years ago people considered this school as an Asylum or a hospital for old people. Later in 1898 the name was changed to "The Virginia School for the Deaf and the Blind".

Let us go on through the years since the ceremony of laying the cornerstone.

Our Main Building, known as Main Hall, was under construction in 1840. The school rented two buildings in town late in 1839 after it opened on November 15th of that year. On January 1, 1840, two pupils were reported in each Department, the Deaf and Blind.
As we go on to March 28, 1846, we found another article about Main Hall: "The Eastern wing of the beautiful edifice designed for the accommodation of this Institution is now completed and taken possession of by the Blind. The other wing (for the Mutes) is expected to be ready by the fall.'

Here are some more comments about the near completed Main Hall on October 8, 1846: "...a beautiful Portico ornamented by six fluted columns of the Doric order, and of two wings, each with a piazza, ten feet wide, for the exercise of the pupils..."

Dr. J. C. Merillot of Philadelphia became the first principal for the Blind. Reverend Joseph D. Tyler of the Hartford School for the Deaf was the first principal for the Deaf. Later Dr. Merillot became the first Superintendent of the school after Reverend Joseph D. Tyler passed away on January 29, 1852.

Around 1853 the chapel was under construction and was completed in 1855. The pipe organ was placed there after the construction. For many years people from the town came to hear the organ playing during the services, ceremonies, and programs. We regret to say that the beautiful pipe organ was torn down in 1949. The chapel is now located behind Main Hall.

About 3 o'clock a.m. on October 26, 1858, the shop building was discovered to be on fire. Some school records were destroyed. Then in

1859, the new shop building was rapidly going up.

When the Civil War broke out in 1861, our state became a Confederate State. Our school came under control of the Confederates. The school was transferred to Stuart Hall (formerly known as the Female Institute) and this school was used as one of the Confederate hospitals. Main Hall was used as a hospital and the chapel was used as an operating room. Several soldiers were brought in and some who died there were buried right on the school grounds. Dr. Merillot became a surgeon when the Confederates took control of this school.

After the Civil War the pupils and staff returned to Main Hall and occupied the grounds.

Right after the Civil War the state of Virginia was so poor that this school had to make their own things to live on. This school had poor food, no heat in the dormitories, the pupils had to sleep on iron beds without springs and the mattresses were made by the blind students in the school's shop. They had no chairs in the dining room and they had to use stools and boxes which were made in the school's shop. This situation continued even at the turn of the century.

This school used to have an old gas house where they had to produce their own gas and heating systems. They also used to have a

dairy barn near the gas house. The dairy caught on fire and had to be torn down a few years later.

In 1949 the book "The History of the Education of the Deaf in Virginia" was published. The author was Robert Aumon Bass, a 1908 graduate of this school. He is the school's historian and is still living today. Today, there is a girls' dormitory named after him, known as Bass Hall. It was erected in 1968.

In 1950 the new school gym was under construction. It is known as the Lewellyn Recreation Center or Lewellyn Gym. This gym is named after Carlton Lewellyn, who was the coach for the boys from 1913 until his retirement in 1963. He was a 1913 graduate of this

school. He is also living today.

Now we have come to the most interesting part of this school's history. Back in 1955, Mr. Bass was trying to locate the cornerstone because in the cornerstone is believe to be a tin or copper box with old documents and various things. He did some research and asked several people for any idea of the location of the cornerstone. One day, a man from the Masonic Lodge came over to locate and pull one of the stones out, which they believed to be the cornerstone, but they were mistaken. Then Mr. Bass decided to find the cornerstone. He me and the search was fruitless. Today it remains a mystery and some of us want to try to solve the mystery of the missing corOde To My Alma Mater

Again, we are happy to dedicate this yearbook to Mr. John T. Floyd for his faithful service to our school.








In this game, we faced last year's VIC Runnerup, North Cross. They took a 7 to 3 lead at half-


